
PPE PAPER DOLL











Help to demystify PPE with this simple but creative print-out-and-play activity.

Print and cut out the nurse and PPE materials. You can colour each of the pieces and then explain them and their purpose as the child is putting them together.

As an extended activity, children can make their own outfits for the nurse to combine with the PPE.

"Additional PPE in the hospital has meant that some children who were previously familiar with procedures now face a different setting and staff who look quite different. The paper doll reduces nervous energy by explaining the PPE, showing the children it's our regular nurses and doctors underneath the layers, as well as encouraging them to decorate and colour, which then they can then take down and use as an introductory conversation with the staff in theatres."

"Preparatory play is giving children the opportunity to be exposed to and explore medical process without triggering their stress. With PPE now likely to become part of the world's wider day-to-day, it's so important that children outside hospital understand it's not something to be anxious about."
